Always a strong advocate for kids, Carton is founder of the Circle of Trust Foundation and has also been instrumental in raising funds to help fight breast cancer. Born in New Rochelle, N.Y., Carton is a graduate of the S.I. Newhouse School at Syracuse University with a degree in broadcast journalism. He is married and has three children.

(NJCTS) puts New Jersey at the forefront of addressing the issue of broadening education and providing services for the more than 28,000 New Jersey kids living with with TS. The Center offers the nation's first multi-disciplinary, cross-institutional program to provide diagnostic and treatment services, training for a new generation of professionals with expertise in treating TS and associated disorders, and insights that can lead to new and better treatments for individuals and families living with TS.

NJCTS SERVICES INCLUDE: family support groups ■ public and professional web-based educational seminars ■ referrals to health care professionals with expertise in treating TS and associated disorders ■ psychological services ■ coordinated patient care among partner and community organizations throughout NJ ■ education and training to develop a new cadre of TS experts ■ professional and educational training for practicing physicians, educators and others ■ research into effectiveness of treatment modalities ■ advocacy and public awareness and other issues important to kids and families living with TS.

NJCTS is also working with the Life Sciences Institute, offering the world's first Tourette Syndrome Cell and DNA Sharing Program that provides qualified researchers from around the world access to collected human tissue and genetic DNA samples for use in conducting research that can lead to better treatments and a cure for Tourette Syndrome and other disorders.

FROM THE NEW JERSEY TURNPIKE

- Turn off at Exit 9, bear right after the tollbooths and follow signs for “Route 18 North – New Brunswick.”
- Stay to the left onto Route 18 North. Proceed north, crossing the Raritan River (approximately 3.7 miles).
- Continue on Route 18 North to the Busch campus
- Take the first exit for Campus Road.
- You will come to a circle. Take the 2nd street off the circle which will be Frelinghuysen Road
- Turn right on Allison Road
- Turn Right on Bevier Road and The Life Sciences Building will be on your right

PARKING: Park in Lot 57B.

If no parking is available in the small lot (Lot 57B), keep straight on Bevier and turn left on Taylor Road to parking lot 54. Tell the guard (if one’s there) that you are visiting the Human Genetics Institute. Walk back across the street to the Life Sciences Building.
