

The New Jersey Center for Tourette Syndrome and Associated Disorders, Inc.

This collaboration among the Tourette Syndrome Association of New Jersey, Inc. (TSANJ), Rutgers University and health professionals throughout New Jersey, is the first of its kind in the nation to offer comprehensive diagnostic and treatment services for TS families, training opportunities for professionals who can specialize in the disorder, coordination of services and research opportunities for scientists looking for causes, better treatments and possibly a cure.

NJCTS provides on-site, district-wide public and private school in-services, as well as in-service programs at colleges, universities, residential facilities, police departments and other community groups for the purpose of educating New Jersey professionals and the public about Tourette Syndrome and its associated disorders.

In-service Providers:

Individuals providing professional development for NJCTS have been trained to follow a curriculum designed and written by the national Tourette Syndrome Association. Presenters are typically teachers and school nurses, or have a medical background. Most presenters also have first-hand knowledge of Tourette Syndrome through personal experience or through a family member being diagnosed with the disorder.

Faculty in-service

NJCTS offers on-site in-service programs for educators, guidance counselors, child study teams, administrators and support staff. These sessions are designed to inform and enlighten professionals about TS and co-occurring disorders such as OCD, ADHD or ADD and the impact they can make on a child's school performance. The workshops also provide educators with specific classroom strategies and accommodations that can have a positive impact on a student's academic success. Our presenters are usually teachers, school nurses or people with a medical background, and most have first-hand knowledge of TS. *Faculty in-services can be requested by either the school or the student's parents by contacting our office at 908-575-7350.*

Peer in-service

NJCTS offers on-site, age-relevant peer in-services to present information about TS to classmates of the TS student specifically, or to the general student population. This workshop is presented by a trained professional who leads student attendees in several activities designed to broaden their knowledge and understanding of TS. Prior to the presentation, parents of the student with TS are consulted about how the information will be presented to their child's classmates. At the request of the student's parents our presenter will discuss the workshop directly with the TS student and answer any questions he/she may have about the workshop content. Our presenters are usually teachers,

NJCTS Guest Lecturer Series
